BORSSUM WAALKES, Dr. Jan van (25 November 1922, Groningen, The Netherlands — 12 October 1985, Groningen)

Jan attended the primary and secondary school at Groningen (the Netherlands) between 1928 and 1941. He entered the State University of Groningen in 1941, where he studied under Dr. B.H. DANSER. He was then an assistant at the Department of Systematic Botany. In May 1943 he was transported to Germany for forced labour until September, when he escaped and went into hiding looked for by the Gestapo. In June 1945 he resumed his studies and obtained his M. Sc. in December 1949. He remained an assistant until September 1950. In October he was recruited for the rehabilitation of the Herbarium Bogoriense, where he stayed until May 1957, only interrupted by a European leave.

During his stay in Bogor he started to make a revision of the <u>Malvaceae</u> for the Flora Malesiana and published some small papers on the species of <u>Abutilon</u> and floral observations on <u>Sida spp.</u> He also made local observations on the rapid spread of <u>Eupatorium odoratum</u>, a noxious weed and reported on small excursions in the vicinity of Jakarta, e.g. the swamp flora of Rawa Tembaga and the flora of P. Damar Kecil, a small islet in the Bay of Jakarta. In 1951 and 1952 he paid three visits to the islands of the Krakatau group, including Prinsen Eiland together with Dr. A. HOOGERWERF. On these field studies he published three papers which were rather important in connection with the succession studies on Krakatau itself and the new island Anak Krakatau.

In 1953 he explored in West Central Sumatra collecting also in the Mentawei Islands together with Mssrs. P. GROENHART and D.R. PLEYTE (May 29 — July 17). In 1956 he joined an expedition to the Lesser Sunda Islands and the Tenimbar Islands with PLEYTE and N.G. BISSET (February 20 — May 3).

After his repatriation in mid-1957 he could dedicate his time to the study of the <u>Malvaceae</u> and by means of a grant of the Dutch foundation Z.W.O. he studied the Malvaceous species described by Cavanilles in M and P (typed report in L). This finally led him to compose his excellent thesis on the representatives of the family in Malesia, a study of 213 species, which excels in accurate detail. Because of the very large number of specimens this was a tedious work. He also prepared an Identification list which must have been a great help to the curators of those institutes of which he was unable to see the material.

In the mean time he had been appointed on the staff of the Groningen University the main subject being the naming of the cultivated plants of the Botanical Garden there, a job he did not really enjoy as revisional work had his preference. Through his faithful personality he nevertheless dutifully acquitted himself of this work. In view of a final version of the Malvaceae for the Flora Malesiana he spent his spare time as much as possible on the identification of all new malvaceous material coming in in the Rijksherbarium. He very much regretted that he was officially forbidden to do so, a most peculiar order. He was well occupied when the Department of Botany moved to Haren, a suburb of the town of Groningen, where a huge, modern greenhouse was built under his supervision. He was rightfully proud when it was finished.

A few years before his retirement he was struck by a paralytic stroke from which at first he seemed to have recovered, but it proved to be fatal, as it was caused by a brain tumor.

Jan was a rather isolated person. He was not married and had, as far as I know, not many intimate friends. He was a dedicated, agreeable person, always prepared to share information and very conscientious in his work and duties. We regret very much that his final goal, the revision of the <u>Malvaceae</u> could not be finished. —— C.G.G.J. van Steenis.

On 24 June 1985 he was awarded the Silver Carnation, an award instituted by the Dutch Prince Bernhard Foundation, for his outstanding work on the taxonomy of the Pteridophytes. This award is yearly given to persons who have made commendable contributions to subjects completely unrelated to their education and regular work (See also Leids Dagblad, 26 June 1985, portr.). We wish to congratulate him with this honour.

Although he had wanted to study biology his parents urged him not to do so and, instead, he became employed in the merchant navy in the former Dutch East Indies. There the only recent book on the local vegetation available in the stores was Backer & Posthumus' Varenflora voor Java, so fortuitously he became interested in ferns. His early collections were lost during the war, which he spent in Japanese internment. He continued his studies, however, and after his retirement he became a regular guest and later an honorary collaborator of L, where after the departure of Dr. E. HENNIPMAN to U he became the inofficial curator in charge of the group. He is well-known for his work on <u>Platycerium</u> and in Dutch floristic circles for his revision of the Dutch ferns. Not hampered by old age he made an expedition to Celebes when he was 70 years old in 1979 (see Flora Malesiana Bulletin 33: 3374, 3386—3388).

For nearly thirty years 'Big John', as he was usually called (behind his back), was the key figure in botanical research in Papua New Guinea. Arriving as Forest Botanist in 1946 he transformed the Botanical Garden and the Herbarium from humble beginnings to centres of excellence of the region. To increase their wealth he made numerous expeditions and field trips all over the area, and later, when he had become Assistant Director he initiated many newcomers in their first experience with tropical botany and actively supported everybody, who wanted to make expeditions in PNG. After his retirement in 1975 he returned to Adelaide, Australia, but managed to return often to his beloved country by organizing botanical trips and by lecturing on the flora and vegetation on cruise ships (see also p. 2345).
