Professor and Mrs Ernst A b b e spent May-August 1964 in Sarawak, making intensive collections of developing inflorescences of Fagaceae for morphological studies.

Mr N. G. B i s s e t of Kuala Lumpur visited Sabah and Sarawak from April to July 1964. On several trips he collected resin samples of Dipterocarpaceae, and leaf and bark samples of Euphorbiaceae, Rubiaceae, Simaroubaceae, Gnetum, Gleichenia, Apocynaceae, Strychnos, Icacinaceae, and others, all for phytochemical investigation.

Dr E. F. B r u n i g, formerly of the Sarawak Forest Department, is now at Hamburg working on his thesis on Kerangas vegetation, which he hopes to conclude in the next year. Miss Chira C h e r m s i r i v a t h a n a works at the Botany School, Aberdeen, on Labiatae of Siam.

Mr P. D a r b y s h i r e changed his job as a collector with the CSIRO, Canberra, for a different one with the same organization.

Prof. Dr W. D o m k e retired as director of the Berlin-Dahlem Institute. He is succeeded by Prof. Dr E c k a r d t who remains in charge of the Institute for Systematic Botany and Plantgeography of the 'Freie Universität'. A second ordinary professor of systematic botany will be attached to the University.

Miss Chumsri H a m b a n a n d a studied grasses of Siam at Aberdeen Botany School until in Sept. 1963 she returned to work in Bangkok at the Royal Forest Department.

Dr R. E. H o l t t u m, Kew, was awarded the Gold Medal of the Linnean Society for 1964. We are glad to congratulate both parties on account of this honour.

Miss Joan I m l a h worked at Aberdeen on the Acanthaceae of Thailand.

Plans are being worked out that Mr A. K a n i s of the Rijksherbarium (Ochnaceae), after taking his Ph.D. degree at Leiden, expects to spend a year in North Borneo for the completion of his training as a tropical botanist.

Prof. Kai L a r s e n, who is working on the flora of Siam, at the Pharmaceutical Highschool at Copenhagen, has been appointed Professor of Botany and Head of the Botanical Institute at the University of Aarhus, Denmark.

Mr David L e l l i n g e r has been appointed Associate Curator of Ferns at the National Herbarium, Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C., U.S.A.

The late Dr R.E.Woodson has been succeeded as Director of the Missouri Herbarium and Garden by Dr Walter H. L e w i s, formerly Director at Austin State College, Texas. Dr H. K. During that time he studied Sterculiaceae with Dr Schultes, took his Ph.D. degree on a thesis on Theobroma. He made a tour through Europe, examining Sterculias in many Herbaria, returned by way of Calcutta and Bangkok to take a post on the staff of the Bogor Herbarium, in Nov. 1964.

Prof. Dr O. S o e m a r w o t o of the Agricultural Faculty of the Gadjahmada University, Djocja, Java, has recently been appointed Head of the Lembaga Biologi Nasional, under which come the Bogor Botanic Gardens, Herbarium, and affiliated institutes.
